There are many people living in needy circumstances, and every dollar helps to support them through another day, week, month, and year. This week's featured Good Works organization is Wild Nest Bird Rehab's mission is to Rehabilitate and Release Wild Birds and Educate the Public on Bird Conservation. Birds are vital to the health of our planet – providing pest control, pollination, seed dispersal, clean-up services, and more, balancing our ecosystems and saving us billions of dollars annually. Accessible to everyone, songbirds offer a ready way to enjoy wildlife and connect with nature. North America has lost nearly three billion birds in the past fifty years. In one short generation, bird populations have declined nearly 30% (more than 1 in 4 birds), primarily as a result of human-caused habitat loss, climate change, window strikes, pesticides, free-roaming cats, fireworks, and other threats. These losses include all songbirds such as Georgia's state bird, the Brown Thrasher, whose populations have declined by more than 40%. Wild Nest Bird Rehab is the only 501(c)(3) nonprofit bird rehabilitation facility in Georgia. Following almost 15 years of experience in her home clinic, Founder and Licensed Rehabilitator Nancy Eilen formally chartered WNBR as a nonprofit in early 2021. Since then, WNBR has treated over 5,600 birds, established a formal training program for those seeking state and federal wildlife rehabilitation licenses, trained over 300 volunteers in bird care and educated the public through school and community outreach. Our volunteer team includes seven federally licensed rehabilitators, animal technicians, veterinarians, student interns, trained caregivers, and operations, facilities and strategic planning experts. WNBR is a volunteer-led organization. One hundred percent of your donation goes toward our key objectives: treating and rehabilitating injured and orphaned birds, increasing bird rehabilitation capacity in Georgia, and educating Georgians on the threats birds face and how they can help.

Alec played HS ball at the Marist School in Atlanta, and began college at the University of North Carolina. That didn't work out so well for the 6'-7" offensive lineman, as the Tar Heels went 1-10 in his first two years. He transferred to UGA, sitting out his first year, during which the team went 4-7. He then started for two years for teams that went 19-5. Cause and effect? I report, you decide. One OL rarely turns the tide so effectively, but in 1992 Alec made the All SEC and All America Teams before the Jets took him in the 7th round of the NFL draft. In addition to playing football so well, he was named to the All State Good Works Team his senior year. The lifelong Catholic got into conversations with members of Athletes in Action about Jesus, leading Alec to find God at a Baptist revival meeting. His Bible study increased and he joined Athletes in Action. At UGA he was named team captain and at the State of Georgia Peach of an Athlete banquet, he was presented with the Role Model Award. THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. GEORGIA TECH

This is the game that Tech has been pointing toward all season. Their conference schedule has mattered in their new puffy-chest stature in the state. But this one just means more. It's pretty important for our guys too, and I expect a game where both teams play as if it's the last game they'll ever play. If I may be so unkind, the ACC has absolutely stunk this season, making GT's record a little suspicious. That early win over Clemson just doesn't seem so great now, with Clemson fighting Florida State for most disappointing ACC team of the year. (FSU wins in a landslide, and along with Penn State has made the Underachievers Playoff.) But the key stat comes in terms of schedule strength: Georgia 12th, Georgia Tech 89th. Tech's record has come against cruddy ACC teams. Tech holds the following national defensive ranks, after a good start, and thus showing a downward trend, even against teams like 1-11 Boston College: 113th in tackling, 113th in pass rush, 104th in pass coverage, 82nd in rush defense, and 114th in overall defense; and this was all before getting blown out by Pitt on Saturday. Meanwhile, UGA is playing against the best, holding them down, and improving every week. They are ready to maintain their dominance and slash the tires on the Rambling Wreck.
