

Anybody still concerned about Gunner Stockton?

I'll confess that I was a little surprised that we were the betting line favorite at kickoff. UT was at home with their 6-figure crowd, and they had vowed to be loud. The Lamestream Sports Media has been waiting to pounce on UGA and so cranked it up to high Heupel hype. We had not done to our first two cupcakes what Tennessee had done the week before to East Tennessee and, before that, a good Syracuse team. The trending pick was UT among studio personalities and the social media crowd. It all added up to a bit of a trepidatious on-ramp to a game with potentially season-defining consequences as an early-season sorting of the playoff candidates.

Tennessee came out like a house afire, with Joey Aguilar completing his first 14 passes for 213 yards and 2 touchdowns and staking the Vols to a lead that seemed to be about 50 points. The crowd was in full-roar mode and salivating to finally beat UGA after a decade of defeats, glad that their QB trade with UCLA had been a steal. After that, Aguilar went 10 for 22 for 158 and two picks, and the best Hispanic-surname athlete on the field was Joenel Aguero.

Like you, I felt pretty blitzed by that first quarter. We matched their first score promptly, but Tennessee just kept coming. I felt pretty gloomy, almost Scowlmeister-esque, as UT seemed to score at will while we began to stall out. My own feeling pre-game was that our defense would hold UT down, and the O would finally open up and run plays that weren't on tape. Our first play on offense confirmed my best hopes for a more diversified offense. But the defense got torched in the first quarter, and after clamping down and getting UT out of rhythm, got torched again late in the game.

What perhaps is the most exceptional thing about this game is that, for the most part, the right side of the OL was manned by freshmen, both redshirt and true, and they got the job done. They weren't spectacular, but they helped us put up 44 points on a highly-regarded defense. And the DL rotated a lot of man-child guys of their own. We knew coming in that we have a young team, made younger when Earnest Greene had to sit out. What is surprising is that the young cats on the OL appear to be ahead of the ones on the DL. And we subbed all the way down to #4 on the depth chart at right tackle, all freshmen, all mammoth, but all inexperienced at this level, and in that stadium.

Big change from last year: Through three games, one at Neyland, no interceptions from QB1, no drops by WRs. Gunner took three sacks from UT, and some opinionators think he needs to get through his reads faster when rolling out, so there is room to improve. What I like is how other QBs around the country have gotten blown up into Heisman favorites—Manning, Klubnik, Lagway, etc.—while less glamorous types like Stockton have been assigned to lower tiers of the rankings. Manning (booed by his own fans after 10 straight incompletions), Lagway (5 picks), Klubnik (2 losses and so-so play), and others with great measurables often get shiny-object attention from the Lamestream Sports Media and their social media enablers. I like our guy plenty.

The studio and broadcast teams said several times that Mike Bobo needs to "take off the training wheels" for Gunner, based on two games of limited playcalling against overmatched teams so as not to put the playbook on tape. It's also worth remembering that the coaches started Carson Beck's term as starter with caution, only opening up the offense as he got increasingly comfortable as QB1. So, between the tendency to help a QB get established before winging it around the field, plus the need to stick with the basic plan till games got serious, our offense produced a misconception out there that Gunner himself is limited, that the team lacks an offensive identity, and that the offensive coordinator needs replacing. Still buying that impression?

Leave it to Coach Smart to sum things up: "We're nowhere near where we need to be. We're a long way from being there, but boy, we've got some kids that aren't afraid to fight."

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

Bulldog fans know **Malaki Starks** as one of the most gifted athletes to ever play between the hedges. His acrobatic interceptions, hard hitting tackles, and blanket coverage of receivers earned him All American honors and a lot of YouTube highlights. His play earned him Finalist recognition for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and Jim Thorpe Award, along with other honors. As a true freshman on a national champion, Malaki led the defense in total snaps for the season. It's hard to be humble when you're that great a player. But the well-grounded Starks is all that, and more. He came to UGA from down the street in Jefferson, where he played QB and DB and dominated every game, earning a 5-star recruiting ranking, being named the consensus #1 Athlete in his class, and gaining the attention of every college program with a pulse. And he delivered on that promise, earning the appreciation of Dawg fans everywhere. But his Good Guy status follows from his contributions to the community. Malaki was one of 11 players named to the 2024 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team based on their commitment to community service. Malaki has conducted a football camp at Atlanta's Cabbagetown Park for 30 young athletes through the Wilderness Works Football Camp. He's led UGA campus tours through its Next Gen Tour of UGA, including a spontaneous football camp for those in tow. Malaki has reached into his NIL earnings to donate \$10,000 to Athensarea schools, a contribution made through his relationship with the Georgia Teachers Initiative, created by the College Football Playoff Foundation. He provided 16 kids from

the Boys & Girls Club of Athens with \$300 gift cards available through Dick's Sporting Goods during the Christmas holiday. When not balling out on the field and in the community, Malaki was scoring in the classroom, majoring in Sport Management and Business and earning the Herbert and Burdelle Mobley Family Scholarship and the Susan & Mark Tomlinson Family Football Scholarship. Malaki is now off to the NFL after three years of college excellence. Expect to hear much more about him on and off the field, making the Bulldog Nation proud and helping to invigorate the communities that are fortunate enough for him to call home.



THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. ALABAMA

One of UGA's advantages is that they have a rotation of 5 RBs, each with a unique skill set to be used situationally, e.g., Josh McCray at the goal line, Cash Jones on passing downs, etc. And a pretty nice array of WRs, again with a range of abilities.
