THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

It's unusual for a championship team to start a walkon. But that's what happened with a high-character guy named "**Dirty Dan**" **Jackson**, an anchor of the UGA defenses of the last few years. Dan came to UGA from North Hall HS in Gainesville, where he was a star athlete but not regarded as a major college prospect. Dan started both as an RB on offense and DB on defense, earning All-State recognition as a DB during his senior season to go with his 2018 Region 7-AAA Player of the Year award and Team MVP as a junior and senior. Dan also lettered in basketball and track all four years and graduated

with the school record in the 110-meter hurdles. Yet, no one came calling when scholarships were being offered. UGA passed on him too, leading Kirby Smart to say when Dan's eligibility finally expired, "Man, to think that guy came to Georgia on his own, without us even recruiting him, and to make the plays he's made. That hit fumble will be one for the ages because he wasn't just hitting a normal dude. That guy's a competitor. A lot of respect for Dan. He didn't even have to come back this year. He debated whether he was going to play football again this year. I think about where we'd be without him, just a lot of respect for him and his leadership. Really, all these kids that want to go and transfer and change and do all this, look at a guy like Dan Jackson. He is what college football is all about, guys. He's not asking for more money. He's not trying to go somewhere else. The guy just loves Georgia." And Georgia loves him. Dan developed into a terrific Power 4 safety, earning Coaches All-SEC Third Team recognition and being nominated for the Burlsworth Trophy, given to the most outstanding football player in America who began his career as a walk-on and has shown outstanding performance on the field. In the classroom, Dan made the SEC Academic Honor Roll as an agribusiness major. Even with all these achievements, his greatest contributions may have been off the field. Dan was rewarded in 2024 with an appointment to the SEC Community Service Team that honors a student-athlete from each school who gives back to his community through superior service efforts. Dan volunteered at Camp Sunshine to help provide recreational, educational and support programs for children with cancer and their families. He also served the Athens Boys & Girls Club and volunteered at the Thumbs Up Mission, which serves the needs of cancer-stricken families. Dan was also a participant in the ESP Bulldogs & Buddies program, supporting kids with disabilities and, along with teammates, visiting hospital patients to help raise their spirits. In his copious free time, he volunteered to help seniors out through the Meals on Wheels program. Dan may well have a future in football, but no matter what he does, this guy's a champion and a winner, one for the Bulldawg Nation to embrace as one of their heroes.
